Africa survey results

January 2023



Context, approach and table of contents

This document contains findings from comparing survey results administered to 4 different group participants across Africa¹


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- 1,000 Kenyan, youth, between the ages of 18 and 35 sampled to be nationally representative across gender, rural/ urban split, socio-economic class (AB vs CDE) and age split (18-24 vs 25-35)
- 1,000 Egyptian youth split across the same demographic categories
- 1,000 Nigerian youth split across the same the same demographic categories
- 24 Tutu Africa fellows with a wide range of social, economic and geographic backgrounds
- This document compares the results at the national level and does not compare results by the subcategories (i.e. gender, SECs, rural/urban split)
- Separate documents analyse the results for each of the 4 different samples, including analysis between the overall national sample and splits across the subcategories
- We tested differences between the three national cohorts and the Tutu fellow cohort for statistical significance (with a 95% confidence interval). As most differences were statistically significant, we only point out (in footnotes) the ones that are not

1 Slightly more respondents were sampled yet once subgroups were oversampled, respondents of those groups were randomly excluded after which a weighted approach was used to get the exact right sample – see weighting description in individual country documents




How worried are you about climate change?



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
When you compare climate change to other issues that impact the African continent, such as healthcare, education and unemployment how important is it to you?

Note: in Egypt and Nigeria, this question was asked as an open-ended question with bucketing ex-post, so they cannot be compared to Kenya and Tutu fellows






What's the first thing that comes to mind when you think of climate change and Africa? (2/2)

Note: in Egypt and Nigeria, this question was asked as an open-ended question with bucketing ex-post hence different types of answers




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Africa Youth Climate Initiative Do you think climate change is more of a threat than an opportunity?





Has climate change affected you and your community?




How has climate change affected you and your community?








On some issues, people feel that they have all the information they need in order to form a firm opinion, while on other issues they would like more information before making up their mind. For climate change, how would you describe yourself?










Do you think climate action can offer you and you community opportunities?

Furthermore, note that in Kenya, this question was only asked of the respondents who mentioned in the previous question that they had heard of climate change before (this was changed in subsequent surveys)
